Learning and growing, with your support

For Sandy and Allan Goldstein, watching their adult son move into his own place at age 28 was a milestone they didn't know if they would ever see.

"We never thought Ben could get his own apartment," Sandy said. "He's really come a long way."

Parents of children with disabilities often grow so accustomed to everyday challenges that typical milestones - like getting a first apartment - seem far out of reach. But with support of Opportunity Partners' hoMEbase apartment program, Sandy and Allan's son Ben is thriving living semi-independently.

At hoMEbase Westside in Hopkins, Ben has his own one-bedroom unit in a regular apartment complex and Opportunity Partners staff have an apartment on-

site that is used as an office. Families feel good that staff are on site to promote socialization and aid in supervision, and Ben can participate in group meals and other activities if he would like. Staff on the premises overnight add a level of security that families appreciate.

Currently, 10 individuals from Opportunity Partners take part in the Hopkins hoMEbase program, with another 10 at a similar program in Coon Rapids.

"Ben's been doing really amazing," said Stacy Ramseth, who manages hoMEbase Westside. "He's happy, he loves having his own place and his freedom."

Ben moved into hoMEbase last August. His family had helped him prepare for greater independence by working with him at home to learn laundry, cleaning, shopping and cooking

> skills. Since moving into his own place, Ben has continued to gain confidence in living alone and has expanded his network of friends.

Ben said he is happy living in his own apartment. "I get to be independent and have

> my own space," he said. "I'm learning how to cook, and I would like to learn how to bake."

Service Coordinator Leah Schmitz said Ben is doing a good job advocating for himself, including asking for more community work opportunities. "He likes to work and does a great job."

When he's not working, Ben participates in many sports including ice hockey for the Minnesota Wild Special Hockey, where he plays goalie, unified basketball and flag football, and bowling under Minnesota Special Olympics. "He always has something going on," Sandy said. "He benefits from a routine."

And while she still sees Ben several times a week, she feels a sense of relief knowing he is capable of living semiindependently and is doing so happily. "I know I won't always be available to assist him," she said. "This is a very important step for him."

A family's legacy

Asplin bequest gift touches hearts

When Eleanor "Elly" Asplin died on August 29, 2018, at the age of 94, Opportunity Partners received a generous bequest gift in recognition of the many ways the organization touched the Asplin family and so many others.

Elly and her husband Edward "Ed" were long-time supporters and volunteers of Opportunity Partners. Ed, who died in 2009, and son William "Bill" both served on Opportunity Partners Board of Directors over the years, and Elly volunteered for countless committees and events. In 1991, Opportunity Partners' Asplin Center in Plymouth was named for the family in recognition of their years of service and support.

Ed and Elly's interest as volunteers and philanthropists stemmed from their daughter Sarah, now 65, who has been an important part of Opportunity Partners for more than 30 years. Born in 1953, Sarah was blessed to have a family who vowed to care for her as best they could and to provide opportunities for her to learn greater self-sufficiency.

"Like a lot of other parents at that time, my mother said how fortunate it was that there was a movement beginning to mainstream children with disabilities," Bill said. "She felt it was a blessing that they could, through their efforts and the efforts of so many other people, provide independent living opportunities for individuals with special needs."

As Sarah grew up and learned to work independently at jobs at Perkins, Old Navy and other businesses, Bill saw how pleased his parents were with her progress. "Every time Sarah took a few steps forward, I could see the pride in my parents."

He said it was important to his father that organizations like Opportunity Partners helped people land jobs and become taxpayers themselves. "He saw the good work that was happening for Sarah and so many other people."

Sarah lived at Opportunity Partners' former residence, Clara Doerr & Lindley Hall in Minneapolis,

and later moved into a duplex with several roommates.

Today, Opportunity Partners continues to support Sarah through Semi-Independent Living Services, and Sarah attends Opportunity Partners' day program three days per week and volunteers at a nursing home.

Bill said the family appreciates how Opportunity Partners has provided flexible services as Sarah's needs have changed. "Each person is unique, and individual needs can't always be met in a cookie cutter model."

Bill hopes his parents' legacy to Opportunity Partners and other charitable organizations will inspire others. "My parents' primary goal in life was to do everything they could to make sure Sarah was OK and had everything she needed," he said. "I believe they felt that if along the way they could help other people too, then they would."

Bequest gifts to Opportunity Partners help to ensure our critical work continues into the future.


