Linda Hartigan finds her family at Opportunity Partners

For Linda Hartigan, 58, Opportunity Partners has been almost like family for more than 40 years. And although most of her real family live out of state, they've been comforted knowing that OP helped expand Linda's world in so many ways.

Saying no to an institution

When Linda was born with Down syndrome in 1964, Linda's parents, Butch and Anita Hartigan, "didn't want to put her in an institution, which was what most people recommended at the time," recalled Linda's sister Georgia Harris. They vowed to care for Linda at home and even relocated to Minnesota from Illinois in part because of the disability services offered. Linda had a wonderful childhood, attending school and traveling with her family.

Finding Opportunity Partners


As Linda grew older, the question of what would happen after high school remained. Fortunately, Linda's parents found her a coveted spot at Opportunity Partners' (then Opportunity Workshop's) residential facilities, Clara Doerr Residence & Lindley Hall in Minneapolis, where adults with disabilities lived in dorm-like settings and learned independent living skills. She moved in just before her 18th birthday. The family also toured the organization's workshop, where Linda could learn to do light packaging. Linda wanted to give it a try, Georgia said.

When Linda's parents had the opportunity to move out of Minnesota, they had faced a dilemma: take Linda from her friends and routine, or have her stay in Minnesota with OP. In the end, they let Linda decide.

"Linda chose to stay," Georgia said.

Linda's mom Anita, who has kept journals over many years, wrote at the time: "For Linda to learn to live independently, we had to let her go," she said, adding that OP offered Linda what they as protective parents could not, including job and bus training. Linda learned to ride the city bus all over town and not get lost, Anita recalled.









Opportunities to live a full life

Linda blossomed through the years, meeting countless friends, taking part in social activities and experiencing the pride of working. In the year 2000, Linda moved to OP's 12th Residence in Richfield, where she lived for more than 20 years.

From singing "Rhinestone Cowboy" at OP's residential talent show, to participating in trips and attending sporting events, to working community jobs at hotels and the airport, Linda's life has been filled with opportunities to thrive, Georgia added.

Linda especially enjoyed the benefits of working. "She'd say, 'What day is pay day?" She also values her rights to vote. "She takes great pride in regularly voting," Georgia said. "You can see that theme of independence through everything."

And OP was by Linda's side through her next transition, when Linda relocated in January to OP's newly renovated and modern Chicago Residence in Bloomington. The house has greater accessibility and more comfortable spaces for everyone.

Georgia said her family does not know what they would have done without OP.

"Her whole life has been much more independent as a result of OP," Georgia said.

A Message from the CEO

In 1953, parents of young adults with disabilities in the Twin Cities knew their children could thrive if only given the chance. At the time, institutionalization was common. These parents yowed for a better way,

We'll be selling a large group home in Uptown that no longer meets our needs. All of these changes will help us serve people better in the future.

After inaction last year among lawmakers to pass important legislation that would help organizations like OP, we'll be at the Capitol with our trade association partners. 
Creative Corner: *Winter wonderland*
